Replacing removed teeth...

Once you've had a tooth extraction, your dentist will usually recommend you fill the gap where your tooth used to be. Gaps left by missing teeth can put a strain on neighbouring teeth, affect the way you bite and leave you more susceptible to tooth decay and gum disease.

Some of the treatment options available for replacing missing teeth are:

Dental implants:

A dental implant is a long-term, discreet solution for replacing missing or failing teeth. A dental implant itself is a titanium screw that's placed directly into your jawbone, replacing the missing root of your tooth.

Dental bridges:

A dental bridge essentially bridges a gap in your mouth. A bridge replaces a missing tooth by using a false tooth that's bonded to the natural teeth on either side of the gap.

Dentures:

Dentures are removable plastic or metal frameworks that carry single or multiple false teeth. They're suitable for filling multiple gaps or if you have no teeth at all.

If you're currently having a tooth extraction procedure, speak to your dentist about options for replacing missing teeth.


So, what exactly is a Dental Implant?

A dental implant made up of three components: the implant, the abutment, and the crown.

The **implant** is a small device, usually made of titanium, and similar in shape to a screw. Under local anesthetic, it is surgically inserted into the jawbone, and serves as the first step in the process to replace missing teeth. Once inserted, the implant bonds with your natural bone, and acts as a substitute for the root of the tooth. It provides the base of support for the replacement teeth, also known as the crowns.

The **abutment** is a connector that is placed on the top of the dental implant, and serves as the connection point and additional support for the crown.

The **crown**, essentially the part of the tooth you see, is custom manufactured to match the look, shape, and fit of the other natural teeth, and then connected to the abutment to complete the replacement process.

Will the implant last forever?


Implants are designed to last for many years. Following after-care instructions will be important to keeping your mouth healthy, even after replacing your teeth with implants.
